The history of behavioral health is a history of compassionate innovation. We are always seeking better ways to improve the lives of those we serve: to put our compassion into action. Like all creative pursuits, it requires the ability to look for novel solutions, to take the perspective of others, and to believe that something new and better is possible.

We are joined today by some of those people at the crossroads of compassion and innovation in topics ranging from suicide to substance abuse. We are honored to have with us today presenters who are making a difference within Kentucky and across the nation. Today we are joined by a leading expert in the prevention of suicide, which, according to the American Association of Suicidology, remains the 10th leading cause of death in the United States—and the 2nd leading cause of death for young people. The clinical screening tools developed by the Columbia Lighthouse Project are considered a gold standard for the assessment of suicidality.

We are joined by Kentuckians working towards an effective response to the opioid crisis. The Ohio Valley region (Kentucky, Ohio, and West Virginia) continues to have some of the highest rates of death due to drug overdose in the nation according to the CDC, with a rate of 37.2% of Kentuckians dying per 100,000 people of drug overdose.

We are also joined by innovative clinicians from within Eastern State Hospital and UK HealthCare who create compassionate responses to some of the issues faced on a daily basis by the vulnerable persons we serve. Our compassion extends to all elements of the behavioral health system.

We are delighted that you have chosen to join us for RAPID this year and look forward to sharing today's program with you.
