Annually, an estimated 28 million multi-unit housing residents are exposed to secondhand smoke in their home or apartment.

Secondhand smoke can travel from other units and common areas through doorways, cracks in walls, plumbing, and ventilation systems. This secondhand smoke negatively impacts physical and mental health. It is essential to have smoke-free policies in multi-unit housing where people live, work, and visit. In addition to protecting the health of residents, smoke-free policies can save money in smoking-related cleaning costs and reduce smoking-related fires. For example, according to the CDC, it would save \$153 million each year if all public housing in the United States was made smoke-free.
